Victorian tissues

Not something to be sniffed at!

How come that so many Victorian cartes de visite and cabinet cards are in such good condition considering that they are all well over 100 years old? One of the reasons is because they were originally recognised as being fragile as well as vulnerable to damp conditions, grubby fingers and too much sunlight.

The Victorian Photographers used several means to protect their precious photographs and these included

- presenting photographs in specially made and printed cardboard boxes
- mailing photographs in specially designed and stiffened envelopes is nothing new?!
- providing glassine pockets to put the photographs into
- selling albums especially designed to house cartes de visite and cabinet cards
- · picture frames of all shapes and sizes
- special forceps made for safely extracting photographs from albums.

However, there was one other fascinating method of protecting those precious memories. By about 1875 someone decided that it would be a good idea to gum a piece of paper, usually made of tissue, to the back of the photo mount and to fold it over the front of the mount to protect the image. However, by 1901 these tissues started to fall out of use, presumably because of the expense of buying them and the time required to glue them to the carte de visite mounts of the day. It also became obvious that 99% of the tissues were ripped off and thrown away prior to

the photograph being slipped into the slots in the custom designed albums that were universally in use.

It was not long after their introduction that the tissues started to be preprinted with all of the usual marketing information that was often found on carte de visite mounts such as

- the photographer's name and address
- services and processes offered
- · medals awarded
- images of studios etc.
- · instructions regarding proof copies etc.

Some tissues, however, were solely decorative and they fall into several distinct categories such as copies of the designs that were printed on the backs of carte de visite and cabinet card mounts; classical ladies, cherubs, angels etc.; birds; children; oriental subjects.

The analysis in this article is based on a collection of 481 tissues attached to Victorian photographic mounts - 330 tissues on cartes de visite and 151 tissues on cabinet cards. Many tissues were printed without a printer's name on them (44% of the sample) - but from the number of examples seen, some of these tissues were obviously produced on a national scale whilst others were supplied entirely locally. Tissues with printer's names represent the remaining 56% of the total studied and the range of firms involved was surprisingly quite few in number - see table 1, page 49.

Interestingly, over 99% of all tissues which have printers' names on, and which are held in the archive, were used by English photographers with only one customer in Scotland, one in Wales and one in Northern Ireland. Very strange. However, tissues were also used abroad.



It is noteworthy that some designs were sold by more than one firm. For instance both the popular Windmill design (see below) and the Spider Web design (see below) were printed and sold by Lund and by Fallowfield, which indicates that there must have been a connection between the two firms. Other designs were also sold by more than one producer such as the 'Bamboo & Two Birds' by both Marion and Abraham, and 'Lady with Star' by REG G E & C and by Fallowfield.

The Lund empire

As can be seen from the table on page 49, the most prolific producer was, by far, Percy Lund & Co. of Bradford who sold tissues in the UK as well as supplying customers abroad in New Zealand, Malta and Bermuda - and probably many other countries as well.

Percy Lund & Co. produced two main series of tissue designs as well as having other connections with the pho-

tographic trade; they sold photographic forceps for extracting cartes de visite from albums, published the Photographer's World in the 1880s, sold studio props and furniture, printed and published the splendid Penrose Annual from 1895 until 1994 AND they became leading printers of postcards in Bradford from the early 1900s as the picture postcard craze took off.

Graham Hall from Bradford is the leading researcher on

the Lund empire; he introduced his 2009 biography of them thus:

The printing industry has been massively important to the city of Bradford for well over a hundred and fifty years and despite a diminishing number of companies involved in such work, particularly over the last thirty years or so, the area continues to employ a substantial amount of people within it. To single out one local company which has

not only been at the centre of the industry locally but nationally as well, with a world-wide reputation, we merely have to turn to Lund Humphries.

They became leaders in many aspects of printing - pioneers in fact - and were certainly looked upon by their peers as one of a handful of companies nationally who were at the very peak of high quality printing, being innovators setting standards recognised throughout the world. Their reputation became second to none, eventually employing over four hundred people.

For details of the tissues in the Victorian Image Collection that were produced by Lund, see table 2 below.

Interestingly the designs were printed on cabinet card size tissues and on carte de visite size tissues BUT although the designs were basically the same for both sizes the quality of the drawing of the cdv tissues was far inferior. So, whilst tissues, or even the remnants of them, can help us to date our cartes de visite they are rarely seen in their original, undamaged state. Nevertheless, they are little works of art and a gallery of designs is shown.
