Taking photographs of groups of people has its challenges but these challenges became easier to overcome as exposure times reduced and as photographs were more easily taken by electric light or taken out of doors.

Several companies emerged that specialised in taking group photographs of schools and sent their employees around the country. George Holden managed the Elementary Schools Photographing Co. and then became the photographic artist of the Home and Colonial Photo Co. with bases in Plymouth and Johannesburg!

Wohlgemuth & Co. of Glasgow offered an interesting and unusual marketing ploy; INDIVIDUAL, framed portraits enlarged up to 'Life Size' from their GROUP shots. How good could those portraits be?
